## *The story of Hogue*

This is the story of Hogue from France to Scotland to the United States and then to Canada and the Grandchildren of my great-grandfather William Frederick Hogue.

The story started with my DNA test and discovery of a large number of people with shared DNA that had traced their ancestry back to various Hogue ancestors by different paths than mine. This is called “Common Ancestors”.

The name Hogue has two spellings and you will find the surname jumps between Hoge and Hogue.

During the story I will only follow my Hogue ancestry and not their spouses, although I am tracing ancestry of them as well and you can find their ancestry on my Web Site at <http://www.barge.ca/public/ghtindex.htm> (You would have to find the spouses name in the alphabetical index, click on it and it would take you to a family page with links to ancestors from there.)

The best description I have found on the Hogue coat of arms shown on the cover was from a book on the Hogue Family of America:

The coat-armor for the Hogues of Scotland is: (*Argent*), three boars' heads, erased, (*azure*), within a bordure engr. (*gules*). Crest:—A branch of oak, (*ppr.*). Motto:—*Dat gloria vires*. A “differenced version” of the above blazon is: (*Argent*), three boars' heads coupé, (*sable*). Crest:—An oak-tree fructed (*ppr.*).

My DNA does show an origin in northern France and many stories I have read suggest that the Hogues either visited or came from an area known as La Hague in northern France.



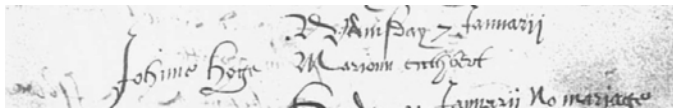
I have read that some think the first to emigrate to Scotland was a Jean Hogue who supposedly was a Huguenot. Huguenots were French Protestants in the 16th and 17th centuries who followed the teachings of theologian John Calvin and were persecuted by the French Catholic government.

However I have read other accounts of how Hogue's came to or from Scotland. In any event the Hogue's seem to have originated in Northern France.

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I will actually start my story where I have some proof and that is in the city of Musselburgh in Middlelothian, Scotland. Musselburgh is a Sea Port located about 5 miles east of Edinburgh on the Firth of Forth where it opens to the ocean. It was called the Royal Port as it was through this port that Mary Queen of Scots was sent to France as a young child to be brought up in the French Court. She later married King Francis of France and after his early death returned to Scotland through Musselburgh to take up her throne. I will not go into her story here but will start with what I have learned on the Hogue's.

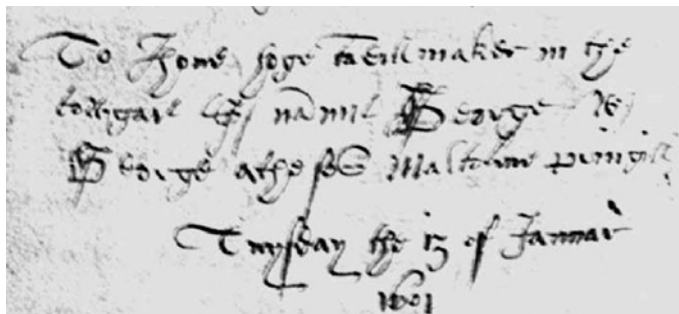
The first I have specific information on is my 10<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather John Hoge who was born in Musselburgh around 1580. He became Sir John Hoge and January 7, 1596 married Marion Cuthbert. Marion was born in 1578 in Berwickshire, Scotland.



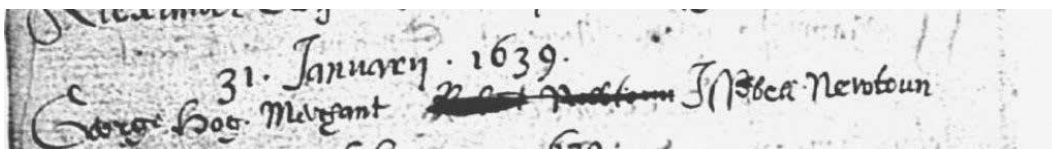
I have only learned of one child named George born in 1600 but there must have been more.

Marion died in 1613 in Bemersyde, Berwickshire, Scotland and Sir John died in 1615 in Musselburgh.

George, who is my 9<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather, was baptised on January 11, 1601 in Canongate, Edinburgh, Middlelothian, Scotland.



George became Sir George Hoge and married Isobel Newtown on January 31, 1639 in Edinburgh, Midlothian, Scotland. Isobel was born in 1610 in Bemesyde, Lothian, Scotland.



I have only learned of one child named James born in 1639 in Musselburgh, but again I suspect there were more.

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Isobel died in 1650 in Perth, Perthshire, Scotland and George died in 1666 in Bemesyde, Lothian, Scotland.

James, who is my 8<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather, became Sir James Hoge and he married Marjorie Lambert in 1658 in Musselburgh, Middlelothian, Scotland. Marjorie was born in 1635 in Lothian Orientale, Lothian, Scotland.

I only have been able to find information about one son, William, born on on April 15, 1660 in Musselburgh, Midlothian, Scotland, but again I am sure there were more.

Sir James died in 1673 in Edinburgh, Middlelothian Scotland, however I was unable to find when Marjorie died.

William, who we will call William Senior, for a reason you will see later, and was my 7<sup>th</sup> great grandfather and left Scotland on board the Calendonia for the new United States as related in a book "A brief visit with the old folks". It should be noted the story is slightly wrong on their death dates as William lived until 1749.

Jean Hogue lived in Normandy, France. The family derives its name from Cape La Hogue. Jean became a Huguenot and to escape the funeral fires, he fled to Scotland in about 1560.

Sir John Hoge (Haig) lived in Musselboro, Scotland. His son George Hoge had a son, Sir James Hoge, who had a son William, born in 1660.

William Hoge left Musselboro in about 1682. He sailed to New York on the "Calendonia". This ship also carried family of Sir James Hume, from Paisley Scotland. His ancestral home was Wedderburn Castle, Berwickshire. His father was a Baron and knight that traced his lineage back to the first Stuart King, Robert Bruce (1274-1329). The family was also related to the parents of David Hume (1711-1776), the Scottish philosopher. Sir James was true to his religion, and suffered persecuticn and imprisonment by the Stuarts. He was released with the understanding he would immigrate. Pestilence broke out on the overcrowded ship and James and his wife died at sea, leaving a 12 year old daughter, Barbara.

William Hoge became her protector and delivered her to her uncle in New York. William settled in Perth Amboy, New Jersey, and married Barbara Hume in about 1684. They moved to Penns lower counties of Delaware in about 1700, then to Lancaster County, Pennsylvania in about 1720, then to the Northern Neck of Virginia in 1735 where a Quaker colony had recieved a 100,000 acre grant. They settled in Hogues Creek, Frederick County about three miles S. W. of Winchester. They gave land for the Opecquon Presbyterian Church. It has been said that the Scotch Covenanters had such a fear of God that they had no room in their hearts for fear of any man. Barbara and William both died in 1745 and are buried in the churchyard of Opecquon.

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As noted in the story above William, Sr married Barbara Hume in 1684 in Perth Amboy, New Jersey. Barbara had been born in 1670 in Paisley, Renfrewshire, Scotland. So she would have been 14 or maybe 15 when they were married.

William, Sr and Barbara had nine children and their descendants became Clergy, Congressmen, Governors and Judges in the United States.

The children were:

- John Hoge born in 1685 in Perth Amboy, New Jersey.
- Solomon Hoge born in 1686 in Perth Amboy.
- Margaret Hoge born in 1688 in Perth Amboy.
- William Hoge, Jr born on March 9, 1701 in Pennsylvania.
- Alexander Hoge born in 1703 in Winchester, Frederick County, Virginia.
- James Hoge born on July 4, 1706 in Cumberland Valley, Bedford, Pennsylvania.
- George Hoge born in 1708 in Winchester, Frederick County, Virginia.
- Nancy Hoge born in 1710 in Grove, Doddridge, Virginia.
- Zebulon Hoge born in 1711 in Frederick County, Virginia.

William, Sr died on August 8, 1749 in Kernstown, Frederick County, Virginia. As per the story above Barbara died in 1745.

William, Sr was buried in the cemetery of the church they had built, along side Barbara. Recently a historical grave marker was installed at the site.



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The child of theirs that we are concerned with is William, Junior, who was my 6<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather, was a sibling of the first Hogue's born in the United States and North America.

William married Nancy Ann Hayes on February 9, 1723 in Quakertown, Bucks, Pennsylvania, USA. Nancy was a Quaker and William became part of that faith.

This branch of the family is descended from William Hoge, the fifth son of the first William Hoge and Barbara Hume. He moved from Pennsylvania and settled in Loudoun County, Virginia. He married a Quaker and whether or not his descendants have kept to that faith, they are sometimes called the "Quaker Branch" and, always, the "Loudoun County Hoges," although they have become multitudinous and widely scattered.

After Nancy died on February 2, 1759 in Bucks County, Pennsylvania, William married a widow Mary Pancoast (nee Nichols) on 3 Mar 1760 in Burlington, New Jersey, USA.

William served in the US Revolutionary War between 1775 and 1783.

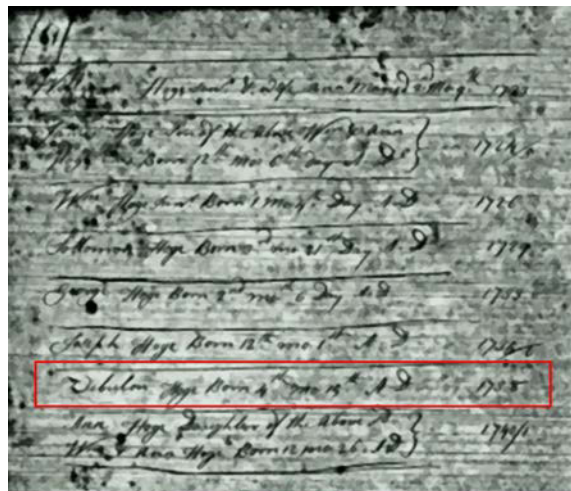

The child of William we are concerned with is Zebulon Hoge born on April 15, 1738 in Page, Shenandoah, Virginia who is my 5<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather and we shall call Zebulon, Senior as you will see later.

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Zebulon, Sr married Barbara Earl, daughter of Thomas Earl (an Englishman who had emigrated to the USA) and Judith Bastido (an American), on September 21, 1762 in Monmouth, New Jersey, USA.

They had four children I know of:

- Zebulon Hogue, Jr born in 1763 in Monongalia County, West Virginia.
- William Hogue born about 1772 in Monongalia County, West Virginia.
- John Hogue born in 1780 in Monongalia County, West Virginia.
- David Hogue born in 1783 in Monongalia County, West Virginia.

You will notice the “U” has been added back in the names of the children at this point.

Zebulon, Sr died in 1828 in Richland, Allegheny, Pennsylvania, USA, however I have not found when Barbara died.

Zebulon, Jr is my 4<sup>th</sup> great-grandfather an he appears in a early census:

Zebulon, Jr married Quaker Mary Timberlake in 1783in Monongalia, Virginia. She was the daughter of Richard Timberlake and Mary Curd.

They had three children that I know of:

- William Hogue born in 1788 in Monongalia County, West Virginia.
- Sarah Hogue born in 1792 in Tennessee.
- Joseph Hogue born on July 22, 1794 in Monongalia County, West Virginia

*I should note that I shared many Common Ancestor DNA with a large number of people who had descended from Sarah Hogue.*

The family moved to Indiana, USA as the next record we can find is Zebulon, Jr's enlistment in the US Post-Revolutionary War Volunteer Soldiers.

Zebulon is mentioned in the history of Green County town of Burlington.



BURLINGTON.

This town was the first county seat of Greene County, and was located on Sections 9 and 10, Township 7 north, Range 5 west, by Amos Rogers, Abraham Case, Charles Polk and William White, State Commissioners, early in the month of March, 1821. The first action taken by the County Board looking to the laying off and platting of the town was in May, when James Galletly was appointed to survey the donation of land which had been made the county by Frederick Shaver, in consideration of having the county seat established at that point. Donations either of money, land or labor had also been made by Zebulon Hogue, Thomas Bradford, Frederick Shepard, and perhaps others. Detailed instructions were given the surveyor as to how to lay out the town. It was at this time, when the order for the survey was made, that the town was named Burlington. Thomas Bradford donated sixty acres in one place and forty in another; Frederick Shepard donated twenty acres, and Zebulon Hogue donated twenty more, making in all 140 acres. In addition to this, these men and others donated certain services and moneys to be used in the construction of the county buildings to be erected at the county seat. The town was laid out in accordance with the directions of the County Board, and David Smith contracted to clear the public square of timber for \$47. Augustine Passmore was paid \$12.75 to clear a lot upon which county offices were to be erected. The first sale of lots occurred in June, 1821, and among the few purchasers were Zebulon Hogue, Thomas Bradford, Ephraim Owen, Frederick Shepard, Augustine Passmore, Zebulon Jenkins, Solomon Dixon, Peter C. Vanslyke and others. The second sale was in October or November, and was almost a failure. In November, the County Agent, Ephraim Owen, reported \$11.60 as the total cash receipts from the sale of lots at the county seat up to that time. The sale had been advertised in the papers at Vincennes, but without material effect so far as sales or receipts were concerned. In November the court house was ordered built, and all the lots of the town then unsold were ordered sold at the best figure, whatever that might be, they would bring. The destruction of timber on the town lots became so great that it was found necessary to appoint Zebulon Hogue, Superintendent, to see that the slaughter stopped. Who built the first house in Burlington cannot be named with certainty. Augustine Passmore was one of the first. He opened a tavern, and brought on a stock of liquor and groceries to a limited extent. Zebulon Hogue probably built the first house; he was the village blacksmith. Frederick Shaver lived there, and James Brown also. In the spring of 1822, a large pond on the streets of the town was ordered "drowned," but an interdiction was laid against projecting the outlet to White River in an angling direction across the lots. Thomas Warnick "cried" the sales of lots, and furnished free whisky, by order of the County Board, to be paid for out of the county treasury. Burlington saw serious trouble from the start, owing to the want of good water. A well was ordered dug, and the work took much money and time. It was found, eventually, that even the well was inadequate to

meet the wants of the town, and talk of changing the county seat was freely current. All the citizens worked on the well until they were tired and disgusted. Upon petition, the Legislature passed an act during the session of 1825-26, to re-locate the county seat of Greene County, and when this became known the County Board ordered that no more timber should be cut on the town lots, as it was seen that the property was to revert to the former owners. In February, 1824, the Commissioners appointed by the Legislature to re-locate the county seat—G. W. Daniels, John Allen, John Johnson, Henry Bible and Andrew Berry—met, and after viewing the various sites, established the new county seat at Bloomfield.

BLOOMFIELD.

Peter C. Vanslyke donated sixty-two acres where Bloomfield now stands, and on the bluff southwest near the river. At this time, there were living upon the present town site or in the immediate vicinity the families of Mr. Vanslyke, Daniel Carlin, John Vanverse, Thomas Bradford, William Robinson, William Scott, James Warnick, Peter Hill, Isaac Anderson, John Mason and others. The first settlers on the scattering town site were the families of John Vanverse and Daniel Carlin. They had come from Washington, Daviess County, as the tenants of Mr. Vanslyke, who had purchased a considerable tract of land at Bloomfield in 1815, before cold weather had permanently set in, these men had come to the land of Mr. Vanslyke with his permission, had erected themselves rude log cabins in the southwestern part of Bloomfield, and had begun the work of clearing a piece of land for the crop of the coming year. They remained there at hard work all winter, "hushing," and living on wild meat and fat pork and bread brought from time to time from Washington. In the spring of 1818, the families were moved out. These families raised small crops of corn and vegetables during the season, clearing in the meantime quite a tract of land for Mr. Vanslyke and themselves, and in November, 1818, the Vanslykes came on. These were the first efforts to subvert the wilderness around Bloomfield to the cultivation and civilization of white men.

SALES OF LOTS.

As stated above, the town was laid out in February, 1824, and the first sale of lots was ordered advertised for the 22d of April. One or more other sales took place the same year. The following men were the buyers this year: Augustine Passmore, George Milan, P. C. Vanslyke, Thomas Warnick, Euel Learned, Thomas Bradford and others. Among those who bought in 1825 were Benjamin Harshaw, Peter Hill, Hallet B. Dean, Benjamin Turley, Daniel Wasson, Nathan H. Cochran, Orie Hinkley, Peter R. Lester, Edward W. Rose, Zebulon Hogue, John B. Kelshaw, Cornelius Westfall. After this and prior to about 1835, the following additional men bought lots: Thomas Brown, James Coffin, Thomas Plummer, Joel Eubank, William

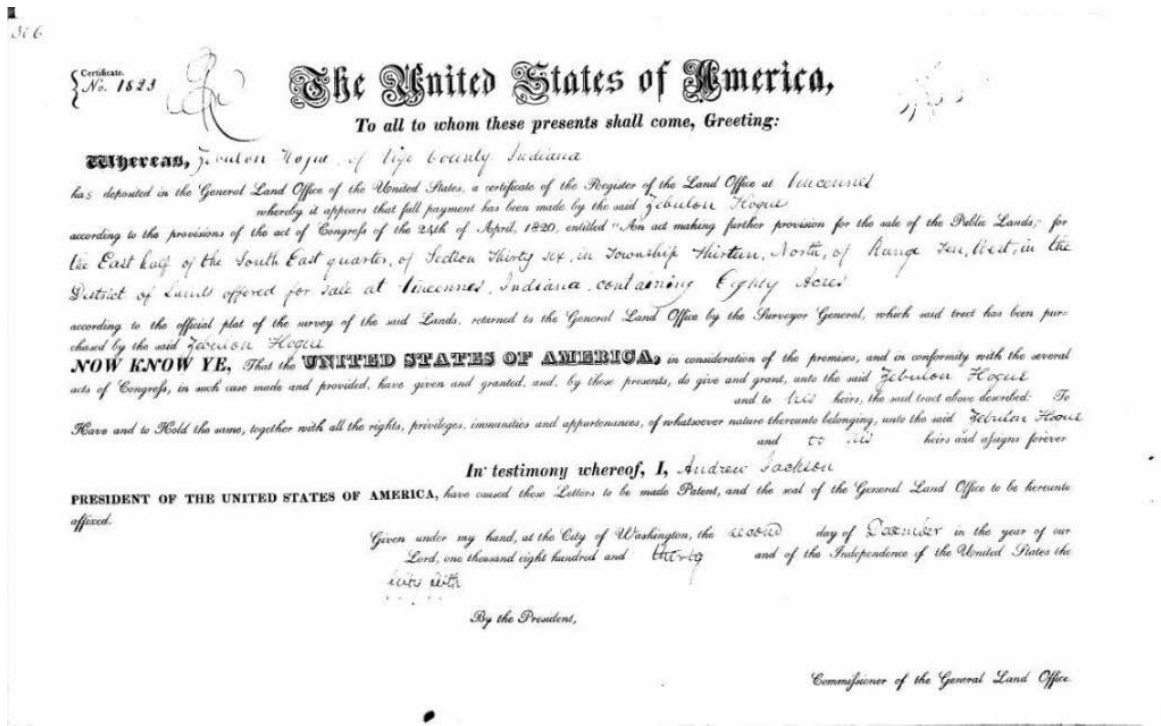
They appear in the 1830 US Federal census:

Zebulon, Jr died in August 1842 in Knox, Indiana. I have not found when Mary died.

William Hogue born in 1788 in Monongalia County, West Virginia is my 3<sup>rd</sup> great-grandfather. (For years I had thought and had been told by other Hogue descendants who lived in Ontario that he had been born and died in Canada, but they had no parental information. It was only after tracing through DNA that I learned differently. There are still many unknowns around him as the birth, marriage, census and death records for Wainfleet Township in Welland County, Ontario were lost in fire. So now I will continue with what I have learned in my research on him)

William married Elizabeth Joseph about 1810 we think in Kentucky as both their children were born there.

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They had two children I know of:

Mary Hogue born about 1811 in Kentucky, USA.

Jedediah S. Hogue born about 1812 in Kentucky, USA

*(Again I still have a lot of questions as the US records are not great. Other researchers have reported that Mary died about 1847 and Jedediah married Elizabeth Brooking on 16 Dec 1831 in Nicholas, Kentucky, USA and that they had at least one daughter Nannie that died in Sa Antonio, Texas in 1946 which I do have a record of. However I have so far not found when Jedediah died.*

*Other researchers have reported that Elizabeth Joseph died before 1820 in Kentucky. William then went to Canada before 1828. I do not know if he left the children with relatives. Again because records in Wainfleet Township were lost in fire what happened next are only verbal report from Ontario relatives who had talked to Lucy Jane Fox and recorded information in Family Bibles and Letters)*

He married Lucy Jane Fox about 1828 in Ancaster, Ontario, Canada. Lucy Jane was the daughter of Roswell Fox and Lucy Cole and had been born in Wollcot, Wayne County, New York.

They had one child:

William Ross Hogue, born 21 March 1829 in Ancaster, Ontario

William died the same year in 1829 and reportedly was drowned in a river.

William Ross Hogue, born 21 March 1829 in Ancaster, Ontario was my 2<sup>nd</sup> great-grandfather.

William's mother Lucy Jane Fox married Andrew Wedge sometime after 1834 (he had two sons from a previous marriage) and they had two children:

Richard Wedge, born 1836.

Alfred Wedge, born 1838.

Thus they were ½ brothers to William Ross

Andrew Wedge died in 1851 and Lucy Jane appears in the 1851 Census of Canada, County Lincoln, Township Louth, page 23:

Jane Wedge, born US, Female, Widow, age 47.

William Wedge, born Lincoln County, Male, age 23. (This should be William Hogue)

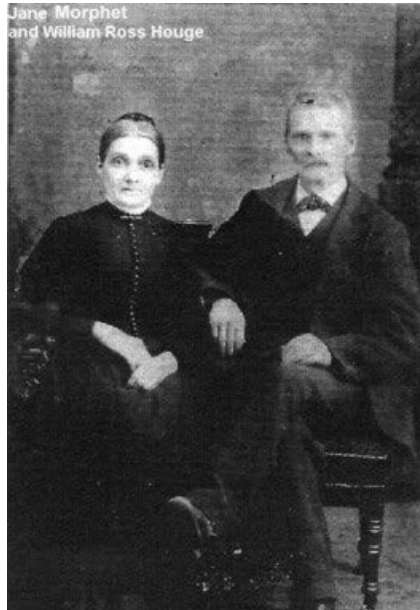
Alfred Wedge, born Lincoln County, Male, age 13.

(Richard was not with them and was probably working somewhere as he would have been 15.

Lucy appears living with Richard and Alfred in the 1861 Census )

William Ross Hogue married Jane Morphet on November 1, 1854 in Manvers, Ontario, Canada. Jane was born on October 4, 1835 in Giggleswick, Yorkshire, England the daughter of Edmund Morphet and Agnes Marphet (Their surnames were almost the same.)

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William Ross and Jane had seven children:

- Lemuel Victor Hogue, born December 1, 1854.
- Agnes Jane Hogue, born July 19, 1857.
- Evaline Hogue, born December 30, 1859.
- Elizabeth Isabella Hogue, born February 16, 1862
- William Frederick Hogue, born April 5, 1864.
- Margaret Araminta Hogue, born October 25, 1868.
- Alice Gertrude Hogue, born December 22, 1874

They appear in the 1861 Census Manvers Township, Enumeration District #4, page 45, Lines 19-23 \*th and 9th Cecessions:

The following story on his first home was forwarded to us by a Brooks cousin, Carol Fraser of Muskoka:

*WILLIAM FREDERICK HOGUE*

*In December 1884 at the age of twenty, Fred Hogue located on Con. 3, Lot 23. He acquired a log house which stood just north of what is now the junction between Deerfly Drive and South Fork Road and by 1891 he had married and had two children.*

*The Hogues left for Saskatchewan in 1900 or 1901. Sometime later the log house was bought by the McIntosh family, moved and rebuilt. It can be glimpsed, now much obscured by trees, on the left side of the Black River Road on the way to Victoria Bridge, just before the bridge over Riley Creek.*

*A drawing of the house was sketched by artist and Longford County cottager Ann Bahen and appears on hasti-notes.*

*Of the original homestead, one building was still standing in 1936 although the roof had caved in. There was a root cellar underneath.*

*Hogue's choice of lot may have been influenced by the road to his property. The year before his arrival, Ryde Township Council had appropriated \$100 to build a road to be known as the Riley (sic) Lake Road and in 1885, another \$30 was allotted to building a bridge over Ryle (sic) Creek. This road became known as the Hogue Road, was used by lumber companies and latterly was the mail route to Lewisham. According to Johnny Ball whose father George Ball bought the next lot, 24, in 1936, the Hogue establishment was used as a resting and feed spot for horses on the mail run. The bridge was constructed of logs and was consumed in one of the bush fires, never being replaced. Early cottager Sage Snyder and local resident Arnold Sopher related that the abutments of the bridge could still be seen in the 1930's. The beginnings of the Hogue Road can be seen .5km north of Towbridge Road; parts of the original road were followed in constructing Deerfly Drive.*

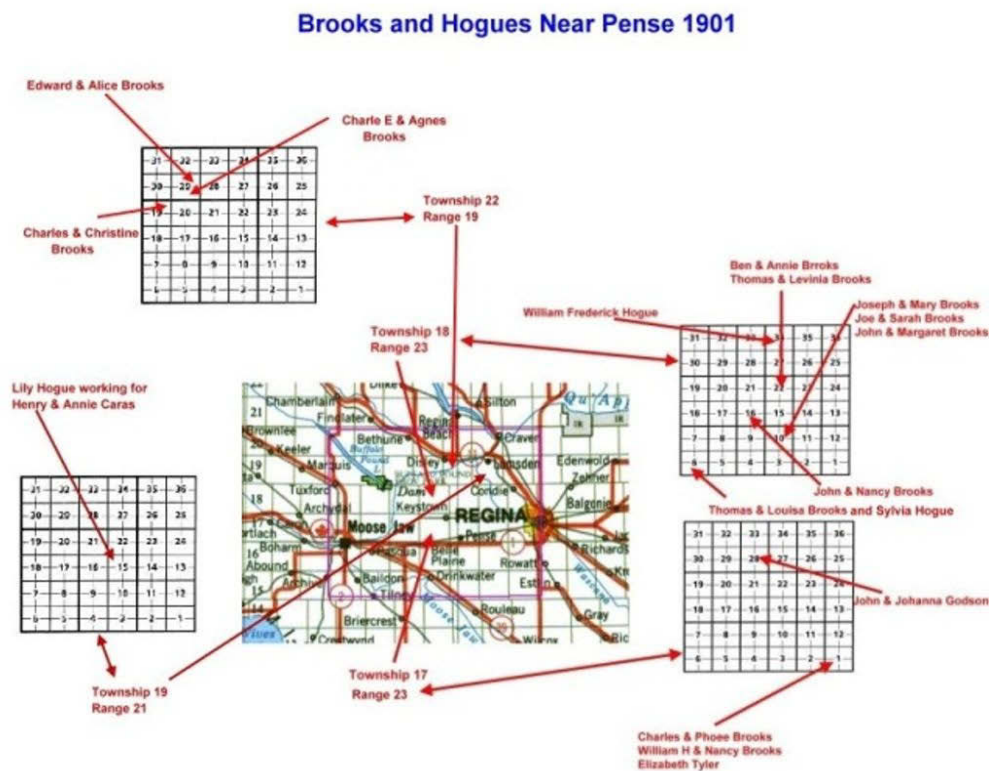

In 1905 Assiniboia Territory became part of the new Province of Saskatchewan. As a result of this creation the Dominion of Canada started a Northern Provinces census to see how rapidly the three Provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba would become populated.

Lilly May Hogue married Frank Mundye Barge on May 18, 1904 in Moose Jaw, Assiniboia Territory, and they homesteaded a farm just south of Brownlee, now to become Brownlee, Saskatchewan.

Lemuel Percy had moved further west to the Pennant, Saskatchewan and got a job as a bartender.

Sylva Gertrude about 1909 married a cousin John Frederick Brooks and settled in Moose Jaw.

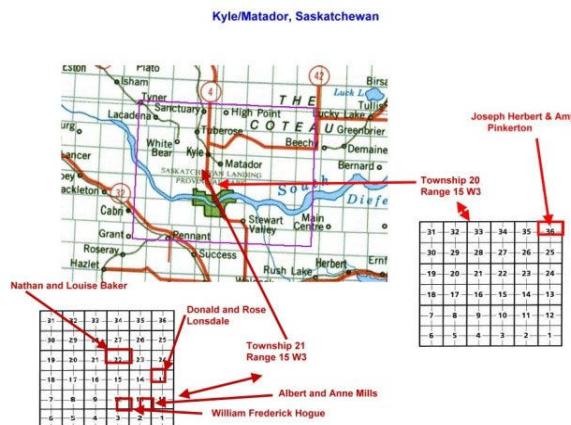
From the Bracebridge Gazette of September 30, 1909 appears a "Brooks Family" letter about "Ryde Township old boys - and this appeared about Fred: Fred Hogue owns a new homestead here and two quarter sections in a remote quarter of the globe. He will probably kill time migrating between the north and south poles. (widowed from Selina Brooks who was buried in Ryde before William Fred left Ryde).
